### Student Investigators Showcase Results at All-City Science, Engineering and Technology Fair







What type of bait captures the most fish? Do different genres of music affect a person's heartrate? Which bounces higher: cold or warm tennis balls? What effect does fin shape have on the flight of a model rocket? Should we use store bought or natural antibiotics?

The results of these investigations and more were revealed during Newport News Public Schools annual All-City Science, Engineering and Technology Fair on January 27 at Woodside High School.

More than 80 students exhibited 58 projects representing 15 categories of science. Projects were judged by over 30 udges from various professional organizations in the city. NASA Langley Research Center, Jefferson Lab, Virginia Living Museum, The Mariners' Museum, Riverside Health Systems, Christopher Newport University, Norfolk State University and numerous others were represented by the judges.

All first and second place winners are eligible to compete at the Tidewater Science and Engineering Fair to be held March 10 at Old Dominion University's Webb Center.

Fourth and fifth grade students representing each elementary school in Newport News Public Schools put their heads together to solve a surprise project.



Students worked in teams to think critically, problem solve and innovate during the challenge February 2 at Newsome Park Elementary School Science, Technology and Math Magnet.

The Sea of Light challenge involved building a lighthouse with a light beam shining onto a pre-determined spot. The place winners were Richneck Elementary School in first place; Yates Elementary School took second place and third place went to General Stanford Elementary School.

The U.S. Coast Guard served as NNPS' community partner for the event. The Engineering Design Challenge is part of the school division's ongoing STEM education initiative.

"It's always a good showing of individuals from various community organizations that come, including from churches and schools," said Michael Nichols, Youth Development supervisor.


"We have RISE! coaches at the schools who make sure that their kids get there. And then they come and stay and support them as well. Some of them even did sessions."

# Staff Spotlight: Two CTE Educators Chosen for Leadership Fellowship






Toinette Outland, NNPS career and technical education supervisor, and Dr. Carrington Faulk, marketing teacher and DECA advisor at Heritage High School, were chosen for the 2024 Association for Career and Technical Education National Leadership Fellowship Program.

Twenty-one fellows were selected for the 2024 cohort of the year-long program, which identifies and trains leaders. Participants complete the program with a strong desire and motivation to support an educated, prepared, adaptable and competitive workforce, according to ACTE.

Outland came to NNPS in 2010 as program administrator for the Heritage High School Engineering & Technology Magnet Program, which received state designation as a Governor's STEM Academy in 2012 through her efforts of expanding career pathway opportunities, leading innovative professional development for teachers and fostering challenging initiatives for students. In 2016, Outland was promoted to CTE instructional supervisor for grades 6-12 and since then NNPS CTE programs have received numerous state and national awards.

Faulk is a creative educational leader, researcher and content producer. He enjoys educating learners of all ages on how to master subjects in the realm of creativity, leadership, technology, branding and innovation.
